By 2018, Milton Keynes, U.K. plans to launch a publicly run, on-demand transportation system in the city's downtown using a fleet of 30 to 40 driverless, two-seater pods cars. Trials are also underway for private use of semi-automated connected vehicles outside of the city center.

Wheeliz, a Paris-based startup connects disabled users with wheelchair-accessible vehicles. Owners of adapted vehicles can list their vehicles for rent in any one of the four French cities

The first driverless shuttle service in the U.S. will be launched at a business center in San Ramon, CA. In a partnership between the county transportation authority and the French company EasyMile, testing will commence in Summer 2016.
