## ITS

By 2018, Milton Keynes, U.K. plans to launch a publicly run, on-demand transportation system in the city's downtown using a fleet of 30 to 40 driverless, two-seater pods cars. Trials are also underway for private use of semi-automated connected vehicles outside of the city center.

**ITS**

The first driverless shuttle service in the U.S. will be launched at a business center in San Ramon, CA. In a partnership between the county transportation authority and the French company EasyMile, testing will commence in Summer 2016.



## ITS

The San Francisco Municipal Transportation Agency released a test version of its new mobile ticketing app. When the app is launched later this year, it will give riders a new option in paying for single-ride fares and cable car rides.

**RIDESOURCING**

Wheeliz, a Paris-based startup connects disabled users with wheelchair-accessible vehicles. Owners of adapted vehicles can list their vehicles for rent in any one of the four French cities in which the service is currently operating.



## RIDESOURCING/TNCS

Lyft announces partnerships with Shell, Stripe, and Hertz. Drivers will soon be able to earn discounts on gas; transfer earnings immediately to their bank accounts; and rent vehicles at reduced daily, weekly, and monthly rates.
